II. CALL TO ORDER

Mr. Scott Pflumm called the Monday, June 21, 2022 Ferguson Township Tree Commission (FTTC) meeting to order at 5:19 pm.

Mr. Pflumm made a motion to approve the May 16, 2022 meeting minutes. Dr. Jacobson seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

1. EDUCATION & OUTREACH

Mr. Pflumm stated that the Education and Outreach Committee is proposing that all new street trees that are planted by the Township have a QR code attached to them that will direct a user to a page with more detailed information. The Commission discussed this idea in depth. Mr. Pflumm called for a motion that to recommend the QR codes be placed on all newly planted Township street trees, Mr. Joshua Potter seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

The Commission asked that all plans that are to be reviewed be added to the agenda. Dr. Jacobson also noted that he has not received any plans and that Dr. McDill normally forwards him the plans.

2. SPONGY "GYPSY" MOTH

Mr. Modricker asked that this topic be on the agenda as he has seen a lot of damage. The Commission discussed this topic in depth.

3. 311 McCLARY COURT WEST - TREE REMOVAL

Mr. Modricker stated that Mr. Lee Grenci is present to discuss a possible removal of a red maple tree on his property. Mr. Grenci stated that he spoke with Mr. Larry Maginnis the Township arborist. They discussed volcano mulching and how harmful it is to trees. Mr. Grenci noted that he was unaware of this, and this is done to most of the trees on McClary Court. The volcano mulching has caused the roots to uplift, and they have taken of his yard and house. Mr. Grenci stated that he is ready to remove and replace the tree at his cost. Mr. Grenci stated that the replacement will be approved by the Arborist. Mr. Grenci provided photos of the tree and roots. Mr. Grenci stated that the roots make it hard for him to mow grass, is a walking hazard, and is headed toward his house. Mr. Modricker explained that Mr. Maginnis did a site view and consulted Mr. Modricker. Mr. Modricker suggested he bring the removal to the Tree Commission for consideration. Mr. Modricker suggested that the Commission view this tree as a part of the July tree tour and then decide. All parties were in favor of doing a site view during the July tree tour. Mr. Pflumm called for a motion to add this tree and neighboring trees to the July tree tour, Dr. Jacobson seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

2.TREE REMOVALS & NEW PLANTING OPPORTUNITIES

The Tree Commission commenced the 2022 Tree Tour by visiting the following locations: 311 McClary Court, Louis Silvi Baseball Field, 6894 Whitehall Road.

The Commission visited 311 McClary Court. Mr. Larry Maginnis stated that volcano mulching is a very big problem within the Township and could be a

reason the tree roots on this street are growing out of the ground. Mr. Lee Grenci, property owner of 311 McClary Court came outside and reiterated the problems this tree is causing and that he is still willing to remove, stump grind, and replace at his cost. Dr. McDill stated that the tree is not thriving. Dr. McDill made a motion to replace the tree subject to the owner covering the cost of removal/replacement, Mr. Joshua Potter seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

The Commission visited the Louis Silvi baseball complex where Mr. Maginnis noted several oak and pine trees in poor condition with hazardous dead wood. Mr. Maginnis proposed the removal of the dead would. The Commission discussed the possibility of roping off the area around the trees for added safety. The Commission also discussed the removal of some pine trees by the pavilion area.

The Commission visited 6894 Whitehall Road where Mr. Maginnis stated that the tree is notably dead. Mr. Maginnis is proposing the dead tree be removed, stump grinded, and replaced. The Commission discussed this tree.

These impressively large and shapely, old but still quite healthy "sister" Silver Maple trees are situate on the farm property originally owned by Captain George Meek of the 1st Continental Army, when a 305 acre tract was acquired by Meek in Ferguson Township in 1790. The largest of the 2 trees is the most beautiful and harkens back to a time frame prior to The Civil War, circa 1854+/-. The sister tree located nearby is circa 1891, still within the 19th century. It is reportedly exceptional for Silver Maples to exceed 130 years, and these sisters are approximately 168 and 131 years old as of 2022. Both trees sprouted while the property remained owned by heirs of the Meek family, and are in the Meek settlement of Fairbrook, very near the intersection of Tadpole and Whitehall Roads, and the historic Meeks' Cemetery and Church.

Focusing on the largest and oldest tree, it has an impressively large, 176" circumference trunk measured at 54" from the ground, which at about that point divides into a beautiful and shapely multi-trunk, vase-shaped configuration typical for this species. It has a high, overarching canopy which provides shade to the area below, which remains green year round, and provides habitat for the many birds, squirrels, rabbits, toads and other critters which frequent the semi-riparian area which these trees flourish in.

The trees were likely within the pasture of the nearby Meek barn and home, and from their early days provided shade to livestock, the availability of maple syrup and other uses, and to the current time, shade and space for picnicking and a child's swing and play area.

The current owners, Darryl and Susan Slimak, are open to welcoming, with advance notice, forestry and other students and interested members of the public to view and study these wonderful trees.
